(2) Participated in development of attack doctrine for AH-1Js in offensive air operations while attached to CNO for Operation Linebacker. First utilized the ZUNI rockets from helicopters (AH1-J), as well as unique fusing and warhead configuration for 2.75 in FFARs, various 20 mm. ammunition.

(3) A plank holder in HMA-369 as the first XO as a Captain

(4) Flight Instructor of Year in 1973 at MCAS Saufley

(1) During active service, I completed a Bachelors Degree from the University of West Florida in Psychology and Social Work

(2) A Masters Degree in Clinical Psychology from Pepperdine University

(3) A PhD in Clinical Psychology from Alliant International University (An APA approved clinical program) I was All But Dissertation as I left Active Duty, finishing my PhD after a year of internship in a locked Adult Hospital and 18 months of Post Doctoral Fellowship in Child Psychiatry and Law.

Personal

(1) My father was a Marine Fighter Pilot, who was KIA on 10 Jan. 1945. He was on a staffing mission over Formosa flying wing on the squadron CO, Major Millington. He was in VMF-124 on the Carrier Essex when he was lost.

My wife and I were guests of honor at the last reunion of VMF-124 about 15 years ago, and while they expressed interest in my career (especially post active duty) they were very gracious and loving as several of the old junior officers who lived with and flew with my Dad discussed many incidents of humorous and intimacy from their months together. BGen. Millington, who was the CO back then discussed the mission where my Dad was lost. My Dad was 2ndLt. Robert Wallace Mullins, USMCR.

(2) I practiced as a Clinical Psychologist for 26 years, specializing in Anxiety Disorders. I treated many Marines and their families over the years for PTSD. I had a Hospital practice, a private practice, and spent several years at Orange County Health Care Agency as a Child Psychologist. During those years, I taught many courses at several Universities including Pepperdine, and Capella. I continued teaching part time after I closed my private practice for several years, finally retiring in 2015.

(3) I was licensed in California and Arizona. I was an active Member of the American Psychological Association, the California Psychological Association, the Arizona Psychological Association. I was active in the Arizona Political Action Committee and lobbied for Mental Health Legislation for Native Americans in Northern Arizona.
