## **Summary of Significant Career Events**

- (1) At the age of 12, while watching the Blue Angels perform at NAS Whidbey Island, I decided to be a fighter pilot. Three years later I began flying and soon soloed and qualified for my private pilot license.
- (2) In September 1978, I received my Wings of Gold and was ordered to VMFAT-102 for training in the A-4 Skyhawk. Instead, I checked in to VMFAT-101 and achieved my dream of flying the F-4 Phantom.
- (3) While still a 1stLt, I flew the F-4 Phantom at "Topgun." After graduating NFWS with 1stLt "Oak" O'Connor, I was privileged to complete three full years in a "Gun Squadron" with VMFA-232.
- (4) Selected with the first cadre of fleet pilots to train in the new F/A-18 Hornet. Joined VMFA-323, the 2nd fleet squadron flying the F/A-18. Worked for Gazelle, Buff, and Jersey.
- (5) Selected as one of three pilots to attend the first F/A-18 Weapons and Tactics Instructor (WTI) class. Introduced MAWTS-1 TACAIR to the advanced capabilities of the F/A-18.
- (6) Deployed on the USS *Coral Sea* with VMFA-323. During Operations in Vicinity Of Libya, flew multiple intercepts and ACM against Libyan MIGS. In April 1986, my first combat MIGCAP was a strike against Libya.
- (7) Joined MAWTS-1 as their third F/A-18 Instructor. Restructured the F-4 ACTI program to optimize the advanced capabilities of the F/A-18. Developed, flight-tested, and certified a new 3-Dimensional LAT program. Wrote new training programs for the F/A-18 FLIR, LDT, HARM, and ECM systems. Worked for Assassin and Shadow.
- (8) In 1989, I married the love of my life, Carolyn. We have four children: Natalie, Michael, Nicholas, and Daniel, and we enjoy helping them raise our four grandchildren.
- (9) Following MAWTS-1, I was able to join VMFA-314 as the Operations Officer. We deployed to Sheikh Isa, Bahrain for Desert Shield and Desert Storm where VMFA-314 delivered the most ordnance of any squadron.
- (10) Served a tour with 5th Marines as the Regimental Air Officer and Operations Officer. While on orders with 5th Marines, I continued to fly the F/A-18 and reached a milestone 4000 Mishap-Free flight hours.
- (11) Was privileged to Command VMFA-232. Led the Red Devils through a challenging West-Pac deployment and simultaneous move from MCAS El Toro to NAS Miramar. Achieved a record safety milestone: 60,000 Mishap-Free flight hours.

## **Summary of Significant Post Career Events**

- (1) After retiring from the Marine Corps, I joined United Airlines. Received Type Ratings on the B737, B757, B767, B777, B787 and A320. Flew more than 15,000 hours in domestic and international operations.
- (2) After 22 years, I retired from United Airlines. I trained in the Gulfstream GV and received my 7th Type Rating. Currently flying charter operations in the Gulfstream.
