Summary of Significant Career Events

- (1) During tour with VF-123, when on a F9F-2 gunnery flight over Chocolate Mountains, the throttle stuck at 100 percent. Slowed down with speed brakes, gear and flaps and managed to get back over NAF El Centro keeping the airplane slow with tight turns. Set up for high straight in final and shut off engine master switch for safe, deadstick landing.
- (2) Later in VF-123 flying the F9F-6 coming home from cross country at 38,000 feet over Sacramento engine started to rumble and temp was going through 1,000. Shut down and shot a flame out approach into Travis AFB. Engine was trashed.
- (3) While assigned to VF-121 the F4 was introduced to the fleet, was selected as one of the first six West coast Phantom instructors. Joined a group of instructors to fly the T-38 at Northrup for Navy evaluation. The Navy at that time was considering the T-38 for aggressor training.
- (4) Tour in Pentagon OP-506 was rewarding. Introduced the AIM-9L into the fleet. Was selected as the OPNAV rep at Nellis AFB during ACEVAL/AIMVAL (Air Combat Evaluation/Air Intercept Evaluation). Out of that program came the requirement for the AMRAAM (Advanced Medium Range Air-to-Air Missile). Member of Air Force/Navy team which wrote the requirements for the new missile.
- (5) On USS Wabash during our Westpac deployment the ship was scheduled for a port call at Phattaya Beach Thailand. Upon leaving Subic Bay we were directed to stop all Boat People, give them fuel, food and water, but not to pick them up. 500 miles off the coast of Vietnam, the task group ran across a small boat with 19 refugees on board. Contrary to orders, we picked them up. Refusing to do so in that environment would have been stupid. That small vessel had an entire famly aboard -- aunts, uncles, small children and one woman who was pregnant. Later on we picked up 95 more survivors. All were turned over to Embassies.

Post Military Aviation Highlight

- During 1990-1998, joined Sabreliner Corporation managing the Undergraduate Naval Flight Officer (UNFO) Program at NAS Pensacola. Operated 17 T-39s modified with air-to-air and air-to-ground radars flown by former Navy, USAF and Marine pilots.
