Summary of Significant Career Events

- (1) Numerous MIGCAP missions in Vietnam. Only saw a MIG one time (on the radar) miles out of range and heading away.
- (2) Blue Angels '74 '76 #7/3/4. Thought I was applying to fly F4s in '73. Blues transitioned from a team to a Navy A4 Squadron, commanded by CDR Tony Less. As narrator #7 in '74, put the first 380 flight hours on brand new TA4 (158722.) Had even more fun the next two years as 3/4 (left wing/slot.) For me, the most exciting job in Naval Aviation.

- (3) As CO, VF161 received the Arleigh Burke Award for most improved squadron in 1985. Recorded two years of accident free flying, longest accident free period in the squadron's history.
- (4) Of my 1115 arrested landings, have 1107 traps in the F4 Phantom. Could it be the top number?
